

Catalog Course Objectives

Directed social science research applied to gathering data in criminal justice and criminological research. The focus will be on special problems encountered in research settings and groups where information about crime is to be gathered and analyzed. Include review of research.

Learning Objectives

The main learning objective of the course is to prepare students to have a better understanding of criminal justice/criminology research and eventually conduct a scientific social research on their own. After completing this course, students will be able to: • identify and demonstrate their understanding of fundamental terminologies and elements in a scientific social research, • conduct a literature review and apply this literature review to their final research project • understand and explain actual knowledge and theoretical background of conducting a scientific social research, • design and create a criminal justice related research project, and • produce a scientific criminal justice social research on their own in the future
